Good news. Release. Freedom. Recovery of sight. FAVOR.

Jesus' prophetic vision is anchored in his Biblical tradition (the prophet Isaiah), he claims this Good News for his time, and he takes this mandate *personally*. The "good news," we remember from this story, feels good temporarily for those who have their native land's pride assuaged. Then, it turns ugly when he reminds them they are not The Exclusive Center of God's great plans for healing and shalom.

Every Christian disciple is called to journey with Jesus, to take in his examples and teachings as the Wordmade-flesh, to grow in his grace and to be conformed to *his image*. How faithfully we understand and prioritize HIS PRIORITIES can have a grave impact on our own well-being and empowerment, as well as on all the other vulnerable children of God in our spheres of influence.

The policy divisions and dilemmas of our time are clear. American Christians don't understand our problems and solutions in the same way, we don't hold uniform views on God's desires or ways, and the many children of God espouse widely varying needs for "Good News." What's Good News for some, can be bad news or hard news for others... even dangerous news. So it has always been. Discerning Christ's will and way is our cross to bear as a gathered community.

How do we affirm the centrality of Jesus Christ's life and message in these days? How do we bear His name and represent him in our thoughts and actions? In our own impact near and far? Jesus' vision from Luke should be the plumb line by which we assess and address any policies - near or far – which affect our communities and neighbors. This is not to impose social agendas on others, but to provide our own moral compass as we seek to understand how to love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

This is a hard time for many, and there is much to discern. What is YOUR vision of how we go about this? Where and how do you wrestle? While I will refrain from using the Eden pulpit for any partisan ends, I believe it is essential that we have honest conversations within our faith family about this time in which we live. I am here for you —ALL OF YOU — as we seek to live in favor, peace and justice.

Minister of Community Care January 2025 Report

Welcome to 2025! These past few months at Eden have been exciting and fulfilling. While I began my new role in the neighborhood in September I am very happy I was able to remain a part of the Eden community. Throughout the last few months, we have continued connecting with our neighbors through many community events, like our shared Thanksgiving service and Christmas Carol Sing with the Congregational Church of Jeff Park and Redeemer of Calvary, our continuation of the weekly breakfast club, In Good Company dinner events with our neighbors and our two other big projects listed below. Thank you all for all that you have done to make these things work so well, and I look forward to what we will do this year.



Bridging Jefferson Park has been actively meeting each month this fall and winter. Since the migrants have largely moved out of the police stations and into shelters our focus in 2024 expanded back out to continue our work with our new and unhoused neighbors. In the fall we conducted a toy drive benefiting Kids Above All which gives Christmas gifts to underserved children across the area. We are also

working with non-profits and government officials in the area to gather and create a resource guide for those in need of services in our area. As we look forward into 2025 we are working on planning a bi-lingual family movie night with other organizations in the area. We are also working on planning more educational and discussion events so that caring neighbors in our area can learn how to best care for one another. 
"Eden Open: Embodying Sanctuary for a New Day"

Background:

Our work on the S4 project began in the winter of 2021-2022 when we applied to and were accepted into Sustainable Solutions for Sacred Sites (S4). This 3-year program of consultation, companionship, and resources for congregations aims to develop financially sustainable uses for their buildings. The lead line and motto is: "Your building is NOT a liability; it is your greatest ministry asset."

SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS TEAM REPORT (CONTINUED)

Over the three years, Eden's S4 team has worked with our coach Caleb (Linden) Lehman, national S4 staff, and our Chicago cohort of churches. We spent Year One in orientation, coaching, resourcing trainings, and discernment about Eden's path forward to the ideal "intersection of mission and money" for our sustainability. It was then our obligation to craft a specific project to focus on for the duration.

In the Fall of 2022, our team worked with trustees and proposed to Council the program "<u>Eden Open: Embodying Sanctuary for a New Day</u>" as the main focus of our continued work. We intended to build upon the previous few years of intentionally creating more community spaces and events within our building AND to move the needle on wise, proactive recruitment of additional partners' use - for both mission impact and revenue. Our goals have been to:

- 1. Search for more space-sharers *proactively* (with the goal of finding 1-2 "long-term anchor tenants"). We've updated flyers, made a space-sharing portal on website, and been placed in external listings.
- 2. Continue cultivating partnership and mutuality with our current and future sharers. We've assessed and revised current policies, fees, agreements etc and created a coordinated on-line calendar.
- 3. Undertake and/or recommend space improvements for security, efficiency, aesthetics and accessibility. Examples: naming/supporting upgrades to Fellowship Hall, parlor; securing pro bono architect assessments re physical accessibility, vetting and passing on solar options, discerning grant applications for basement rehab (City of Chicago, 2022; Partners for Sacred Spaces 2024).
- 4. Create new administrative staffing/processes to coordinate space use wisely

In November of 2024, some members of the Eden S4 team met with the members of the other member churches of the Chicago Cohort. During this meeting. We learned about the work each congregation did over the last three years. It was enormously beneficial for all of us to learn about what others were doing with their buildings in the city.

While the official program has ended the Chicago cohort has agreed to continue to meet quarterly in 2025 to support each other in our building work. Members of the Eden Team met on December 5 for our final session with our coach. We have agreed to meet monthly for an additional 3-6 months to wrap up or hand off tasks essential to this momentum in growing how we share our space well with our neighbors.

Christian Education Report 2024

Since our last meeting, the CE committee has accomplished a number of projects / events. Beginning in June, after a successful Summer FunCamp session, the Rec Room floor was removed, abated and replaced with a durable vinyl tile for many years of service. A huge "thank you" to Nora and Mike Edens and all the folks who helped in coordinating and moving items out, preparing the space, and replacing all the items back after the new floor was installed. Throughout summer and fall, Nora Edens (with Mike's help as well as others), have continued re-organizing various book cases, shelves and the CE closet off the upstairs hall. It's much easier to find the many things used by our families and children now. Late in the summer, we had a well -attended Campfire Nite and Rally Day Weekend that included community-related as well as faith-related events. From S'mores to scary stories; and from kids activities to craft projects, Rally Day Weekend was a most enjoyable time! Two more Friday events, another Campfire Nite and a Movie Nite, were attended by both Eden families and others from the neighborhood. In the fall, an adult-education book study was led by Pastor Jacki based on the book of Revelation.


After Larry Pavia started an "R-Space Drop-in" event for December before Christmas a couple years ago, this year's event was a great success! Parents were able to run last minute holiday errands while their kids played in the gym and Rec Room. In all, some 27 children attended and \$180 was netted for the CE after expenses. Nora had teens Tiernan and Emmett and Josie Lee help with staffing, helping the day go smoothly. Speaking of R-Space, the popular after-school program has been averaging between 25 to 30 children on Tuesday afternoons. Staff and volunteers ranging from Pastor Jacki, Sarah Foster to Larry Pavia, Nora Edens, Gwynne Carlson (R of C), Megan Dunning, Eleanor Maas, Sarah Delezen and others, have all helped make R-Space a safe, fun environment for kids in our church and community. Closing out 2014 was our Christmas Holiday Santa Bash with 13 children attending craft projects and other activities, receiving gifts from Santa [put name here], and a festive buffet lunch to cap it off.

As we head into 2025, we will be hosting a Family Games Nite on January 24 as well as another Movie Nite in late February / early March. In April or May (depending on weather) we will head back outside for Campfire / Game Nite events. Meanwhile, Larry and Nora are planning for Summer FunCamp '25! Proposed dates are the two weeks following the end of the CPS school year, or June 16-20 and June 23-27, along with a couple Summer FunDays for July / August. There will be activities proposed for Palm Sunday and Easter as well as a year-end event. With the addition of several children during church, a faith-based "Sunday School" and kids-in-church activities are going to be looked into. Pastor Jacki will be engaging, with assistance by Sarah Foster, additional adult-oriented programs such as In Good Company dialogue practice sessions, and more book studies (if interested, see Jacki). In all, 2025 is promising to be a fun and

eventful year for our CE team!

TRUSTEES REPORT JULY 2024-JANUARY 2025

The past six months has seen many work projects/repairs made to our church home. After our last Congregational Meeting on June 23, 2024, the asbestos abatement of the recreation room on the second floor was performed June 26-28 at a cost of \$8400.00. On July 8th, Luna flooring began the install of the new floor in the recreation room and completed their work on July 11th. Total Cost \$11,364.00

Later in July Fortune Restoration began exterior tuck pointing repairs on the east and north walls of the addition. Repairs were also made to failing interior cinder blocks on the east wall of the gymnasium. Total bill for services \$3,860.00.Our deposit for the work was \$1,148.00 leaving a balance of \$2,712.00. We received word from the President of Fortune Restoration, Mr. Robert Fortune that this balance was being forgiven as a gift to our church. In addition to this gift, Fortune also donated their services for stripping and refinishing the exterior Sanctuary doors on Gunnison St. in loving memory of our late Office Manager, Erin Ravelingeen.

On August 7th Servicemaster began stripping and refinishing the floors in the Gymnasium, Fellowship Hall, Kitchen and west stairwell and landing. Work was completed on August 8^{th.} Total cost \$3,123.00. On September 16th the main water line feeding the boiler was replaced. Total cost \$940.00 (This repair was made with funds donated earlier by Gene Schnarr).

On November 26th, repairs to replace a leaking hot water line in the basement hall were made. Total cost \$1,718.00.

*Special Thanks to David Chernich and Mike Edens who made additional repairs and upgrades in the bell tower to prevent further access by squirrels, birds and other potential varmints.

*Special Thanks to Sheri & Noel Brooks for donating services of their landscaper to provide grass cutting and edging during the HOT months of July & August!

Daryl is most appreciative!!

*Special Thanks to Ed & Debbie Thomas, Nora & Mike Edens, Mike Dwyer, Katie Dahmer, Penny Dahmer, Jeff Lorenty & sons, and Scout Leaders who helped move out, and back in all furniture and items in the Recreation Room during the rehab work.

In late November all gutters were cleaned for a cost of \$260.00.Bids were solicited for snow removal and deicing services from four different vendors in late fall. Bids ranged from a high of \$270.00 to a low bid of \$160.00 per service of 1"-6" of accumulation. The low bid was accepted and approved.

The following is a list of items repaired/replaced by Trustee Ed Lorenty:

- Replace door bell, chime, and button on Leclaire St Door.
- Rework timers for lighting of courtyard at Fellowship Hall entry.
- Replace fixtures in first floor coat closet and basement storage room.
- Repair pendant fixture in first floor bathroom.
- Parsonage work: Replace defective switch in first floor bathroom, replace broken pull chain fixtures in basement and bedroom closet. Repairs for flag pole lighting will have to wait for warmer weather to replace broken parts.

Trustee Debbie Lorenty is currently securing bids for cleaning services from several service providers.


